As you may know the Belgian National Internet Exchange is squeezed between three big neighboring Internet Exchanges in London, Amsterdam and Frankfurt. And although we are a small regional player, we have always strived for speed, stability, high performance, and value for money. Throughout the years we have stayed true to these core values and to our core competences. I'm proud to say that this has paid off.

During our **21 years of existence** our participants have increased in number, up to 58, and in terms of diversity. We do not only support larger companies, local internet and content providers, or Web hosting and data storage suppliers. More recently we have welcomed global content providers such as Microsoft, Facebook and CloudFlare. We are delighted that Jérôme Fleury, the Network Engineering Manager of CloudFlare, will elaborate on his company and their participation to BNIX later this evening.

The involvement of such big players proofs that BNIX is growing in importance while adding value to its participants. We ensure that they can **exchange traffic better, faster and cheaper**. In return, our participants can deliver the best services to their customers for which user friendliness, speed and high quality of service are increasingly important.

This evolution in consumer behavior is related to technological evolutions such as mobile, e-commerce, analytics and the Internet of Things. Traffic is still growing exponentially and it doesn't look like it is going to stop doing that soon.

Our Belgian government is also conscious of this evolution. Reinhard Laroy, advisor in the cabinet of Minister Alexander De Croo and specialist in telecom
